Ten questions with a maker

1. What do you make?

Internet of Things devices, wirelessly connected to the Cloud, usually displaying data in some way and often using multi-colour LEDs. My projects are usually based on the Arduino (specifically the <u>ESP-8266 Wemos</u>) or the Raspberry Pi. I love my 3D printer, which I use to create the cases for projects. I'm a software engineer by profession and an electronics hobbyist, so I've got the whole end-to-end skill set needed to create cool gadgets.

Recent devices include the GlowOrb family of single pixel output devices (above right) and the TideWatch (above left), which is a project I did over the Christmas holidays in collaboration with my daughter. It shows the comings and goings of the tide on the South side of the Isle of Wight where we live. Blue dots represent the sea and green dots show the exposed land as the tide goes out. Each cycle of the tide (low to high or high to low) takes about six hours, hence the six LEDs.

2. What does your making space look like?

Some combination of my study, where breadboards and wires fight for space with my laptop and papers on my desk; the kitchen table, which is often the production line for making batches of GlowOrbs; and my workshop at the back of the garage, which is a bit of a mess, but has tools and parts for every job around the house and garden, as well as my soldering station and electronics assembly tools.

3. Where do you sell your makes?

Currently just through word of mouth, mostly twitter, via a <u>PayPal link</u>, which will get you a GlowOrb, for example. I'm planning to launch the GlowOrbs on the <u>RS DesignSpark</u> <u>MarketPlace</u>, but haven't taken the plunge yet. Mostly because my day job keeps me very busy and this is very much a back-burner project.

4. Who inspires you?

People who come up with cool ideas and actually implement them. So many people say "you could do this" or "someone should do that". It's the people who actually have the inspiration and motivation to turn the ideas into reality who inspire me.

5. What's your best failure?

My electronic river monitoring solution, which had a series of electrodes wired together along the length of a piece of wood. For some reason (mostly, I think because aluminium has an oxide layer on the outside and water isn't a great conductor of electricity) it didn't work at all. You can see me describing this and some other home automation inventions here.

6. What's your favourite magazine / podcast / youtube channel / other making related "thing"?

I dip into The MagPi magazine occasionally, but apart from that, I watch random YouTube videos from time to time when they show off something cool that someone's done.

7. Do you meet up to discuss / make with other makers? If so, where?

I have been to a few Raspberry Jam type events, but not many. I tend to do most of my interaction online via Twitter - both in public, and through DMs.

8. What's been the hardest thing about making for a living for you?

I don't earn my living as a maker - I'm very fortunate to have a great career at IBM. Making is very much a hobby.

9. What's the best thing about making for a living?

I don't "make" for a living.

10. Whose work would you recommend that fellow Guild members should check out?

If you're interested in some serious mechanical engineering, Lisa Milne (@tiklishhoneybee) does amazing metal work for model trains.

Dr Lucy Rogers (<u>@drlucyrogers</u>) is, of course, always doing cool stuff, and is very much in the inspiring category of someone who actually makes real their ideas.

Alex Lennon (<u>@embedded_iot</u>) is doing cool work at DoES Liverpool with LoRa and other emerging technologies, and has been working in the area we now know as the Internet of Things for longer than I have, which really is saying something!
